
Transmission of HIV

HIV is spread mainly through unsafe sexual intercourse, blood transmission, syringes that are used by more than one person who are using it for taking drugs and from mothers to the child during the pregnancy and breast feeding. Transmission of HIV through blood has been very common during the initial time of its spread but nowadays all the developed and developing countries established stringent measures for this process. But while having unsafe sex with the person who is affected by HIV it spreads to the other normal person as well. It is also easily spread from the pregnant mother to her child before the delivery and during the breast feeding.

AIDS Symptoms

HIV attacks and affects the white blood cells (WBC) and lowers the overall immune system. It takes 0 to 12 years for the symptoms to appear promptly. A few common symptoms are fever, nausea and vomiting. loss of weight, dysentery, swollen nodes, night sweating, skin rashes and so on...

Role of Social Worker

Social workers have the knowledge and skills to deal effectively with HIV/AIDS patients and those who are affected by the disease, such as family members, friends, partners, and children. Social workers have the unique ability to work with people in their natural environments and advocate for change that best suits their needs.

Social workers provide a wide range of services and support to people living with HIV/AIDS on an individual basis. Income support bureaucracies, education/training programmes and career planning, prescription drug programmes and policies, short- and long-term disability programmes, housing, human rights legislation, addictions services, legal services, services and resources for gay, lesbian, and bisexual people, and nutrition and food security are all resources that social workers are familiar with. Social workers frequently assist people living with HIV/AIDS in navigating these systems while also empowering them to make educated health decisions.

New diagnoses, disclosure, intimate partner violence, depression, fertility, anxiety, relationships (intimate and familial), grief and loss, and addictions are among issues that social workers can help with. They frequently work as part of a multidisciplinary team to provide support to people who are suffering from a chronic illness. A nurse practitioner, physician,

pharmacist, psychologist, psychiatrist, immunologist, and a public health advocate may be on the team.
